

Enhancing Disaster Preparedness & Community Resilience

Why This Project Matters

Escalating Threats:

- North Texas has experienced COVID-19, Hurricanes Harvey & Laura, Winter Storm Uri, severe storms, and wildfires.
- Disasters are becoming more frequent and more severe.

Vulnerable Communities:

- The region includes 1,351 census tracts identified as disadvantaged via the Climate & Economic Justice Screening Tool.
- These communities face compounded risks: economic challenges, limited healthcare access, language barriers, and inadequate emergency resources.



RCPGP Overview: Three Years / Three Phases

Phase I – Awareness & Preparedness:

- Enhance Public Outreach:
 - o Update the "KnoWhat2Do" campaign with new videos, brochures, and digital materials that detail local threats and climate impacts
- Begin Developing Communication Tools:
 - Create a Language Access Toolkit to ensure critical emergency information is accessible to non-English speakers and other vulnerable groups
- Establish a Regional Planning Group:
 - o Bring together emergency managers, community leaders, and VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster) partners to coordinate training and information sharing

Phase II – Strengthening Emergency Response Plans:

- Equity & Risk Assessment:
 - Conduct detailed community surveys to identify specific evacuation needs and assess current insurance coverage gaps

RCPGP Overview: Three Years / Three Phases

Phase II – Strengthening Emergency Response Plans continued:

- Plan Enhancements:
 - o Revise and update emergency response and evacuation plans to incorporate survey findings, ensuring plans are inclusive and equitable
- Regional Table-Top Exercises
 - Conduct table-top exercises to highlight areas prone to disaster impacts and to focus on the needs of vulnerable populations

Phase III – Community Resilience Workshop:

- Two-Day Workshop:
 - Host a comprehensive workshop for community leaders, emergency responders, and key stakeholders
- Sharing Best Practices:
 - o Present deliverables from Phases I and II, discuss challenges, and align on best practices to improve regional disaster resilience

Severe Thunderstorms

Emergency Terms

- o Severe Thunderstorm Watch
 - Favorable conditions for the development of severe thunderstorms
- Severe Thunderstorm Warning
 - Issued when a severe thunderstorm is detected. National Weather Service defines a severe thunderstorm as one that produces 58 mph winds or stronger and/or hail one inch in diameter or larger
- Protective Actions
 - Seek shelter inside a sturdy building and stay away from windows

Difference Between Thunderstorm Watch and Thunderstorm Warning



Thunderstorm Watch

It's an alert given by the weather forecasting team to the public, so they could prepare themselves in advance for extreme conditions.



Thunderstorm Warning

It's a warning issued when a thunderstorm has been seen already and emergency action needs to be taken.

Severe Winter Weather

- Emergency Terms:
 - Winter Storm Watch
 - Conditions favorable for heavy sleet, ice, heavy snow
 - Winter Storm Warning
 - Significant winter weather to include snow, ice, sleet
 - o Black Ice
 - Cold rain droplets forming clear ice on roadways, creating slick conditions
- Protective Actions:
 - Winterize your vehicle at the beginning of the season Keep spare blankets and provisions in your vehicle in case you get stranded
 - Wear several layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing instead of one heavy layer of clothing





Extreme Heat

- Emergency Terms:
 - Extreme Heat Watch Be Prepared!
 - Issued when conditions are favorable for an excessive heat event in 24-72 hours
 - Extreme Heat Warning Take Action!
 - Issued when temperature is expected to be 105° or higher for 2 consecutive days
 - Heat Advisory Take Action!
 - Issued when temperature is expected to be 103° or higher for 2 consecutive days
- Protective Actions
 - Drink plenty of water
 - Limit sun exposure and stay inside during the warmest hours
 - Protect face
 - Muscle pains & spasms are first indicator of heat exhaustion
 - Heatstroke, potentially life-threatening, heat-related problem

Emergency Terms

- o Tornado Watch
 - Conditions favorable to form, remain alert/monitor weather
- Tornado Warning
 - Tornado has been spotted. Take immediate ACTION!

Protective Actions

- O Seek shelter if a tornado is imminent or in progress
- Know your designated shelter location for your <u>home</u> or <u>work</u> location

Tornado Shelter Characteristics

- Basement or ground floors
- o If underground shelter is unavailable, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor
- Make sure to stay away from windows
- O Lower-level interior bathrooms provide good protection

TORNADO SAFETY




<u>Tornado Watch</u> - Tornadoes are possible in the area you live in. Listen to the radio or watch the television for updates. Be prepared to move to safety.

Tornado Warning - A tornado has either been spotted by Doppler radar or one is on the ground. You should find shelter immediately!

During a Tornado -

- Go to a basement
- If there is no basement, go to a room in the center of the building, on the lowest floor, with no windows. (A bathroom or closet if possible.)
- Get under the sturdiest piece of furniture if you can.



- Do NOT try to outrun a tornado in a car. It is safer to get out of it and leave it to seek shelter.
- If you are outside, go to a low lying area, like a ditch, and lie down



Floo ds

• Emergency Terms

- o Flash Flood Watch
 - Current or developing conditions that are favorable or a flash flooding; not certain or imminent
- Flash Flood Warning:
 - Flash flooding is imminent or already occurring
- Protective Actions
 - o TURN AROUND, DON'T DROWN!
 - SIX inches of fast-moving water holds enough power to knock over an adult
 - o TWO feet of water can carry away most vehicles
 - Avoid areas that are flooded or prone to flash flooding during heavy thunderstorms

Emergency Plans & Emergency Kits

Reminder: When disaster strikes, city services may be cut off and local disaster relief and government responders may not be able to reach you

- Emergency Plans
 - Having an emergency plan in place can aid while you wait
 - A little preparation could protect your life and the lives of those around you
 - o Emergency plans include:
 - Information on household members
 - Pets
 - Meeting places for each hazard
 - Emergency numbers

- Emergency Kits
 - Pack supplies in a duffle, storage container that is easy to access
 - Emergency kits include:

Water Radio

First Aid Kit Maps

Food Flashlight

Personal Items Cash

Medications and medical supplies

- Registering in STEAR DOES NOT guarantee you will receive a specific service during emergencies



Outdoor Warning System

- The outdoor warning sirens (OWS) are designed to alert the community of dangerous outdoor conditions
- Monthly testings happen the first Wednesday of the month at 1 PM
