
Who We Are




Legal Services in Texas

What We Cannot Do

- We cannot handle medical malpractice, class actions, assisted suicide, or personal injury cases
- We cannot provide representation in criminal matters







Civil vs. Criminal Law: What's the difference?

CRIMINAL LAW

- Deals with criminal acts
- State vs Defendant*
- Defense Attorney
- Misdemeanor / Felony
- Punishment: Fines, Jail, Criminal Record
- Probation / Parole

*Exception: Expunctions and nondisclosures of criminal records when allowed by statute

CIVIL LAW

- Landlord / Tenant
- Wills / Estates
- Real Property / Home Ownership
- Corporate / Business / Contracts
- Torts / Personal Injury
- Divorce / Custody / Support
- Protective Orders
- Punishment: Fines, Injunctions, Orders

Legal Aid Eligibility

In order for an individual to be eligible to receive services through LANWT, he or she must be:

- Income eligible
- Asset eligible
- A U.S. Citizen or qualify under another legal status <u>and</u>
- Have a legal problem within approved priorities

What is "Income Eligible"?

Short answer:

An individual who is at or below 200 percent of Federal Poverty Guidelines

Example: A family of 4 has annual household income of \$53,000 (2021 levels)









What is "Asset Eligible"?

An individual seeking assistance may not have total family assets in excess of \$10,000, plus \$5,000 for each additional family member

Eligibility and Citizenship

- To be eligible for services, an individual must be a U.S. Citizen or have another legal status to be in this country (e.g., permanent resident, refugee, asylee)
- If a person is not a citizen and does not have legal status, LANWT can provide civil legal assistance only if the person is a victim of domestic violence

What are "Approved Priorities"?

- LANWT's Board of Directors, in consult with LANWT Administration and Branch Managers, determines the types of cases within a given area that are "priorities" when considering an applicant's case
- For example, under the area of family law, obtaining a divorce and child support for a victim of domestic violence is a priority. Obtaining a divorce for a couple who have been separated for years and have no property and no minor children is not

Some Examples of LANWT Priorities

- Consumer and Finance: Predatory Lending, Deceptive Trade Practices, Debt Collections
- Education: Special Education, Access to Resources, Discipline
- Family: Orders of Protection, Divorce, and Child Custody Involving Family Violence; Adoption; Adult Guardianship
- Housing: Subsidized Housing, Landlord/Tenant, Mortgage Foreclosure, Predatory Lending, Property Tax Issues
- Health: Medicaid, Medicare, CHIP, Home Health Care
- Income Maintenance: TANF, SNAP, Social Security, Unemployment Compensation, Essential Needs Driver's License

What is "Lack of Resources"?

- After an intake interview and staffing, Applicants may receive a letter from LANWT that says we could not take a case "due to lack of resources"
- This means that, although the Applicant needed or wanted legal representation, only advice could be provided because of existing case loads by staff attorneys or similar limitations on time or staffing

Lack of Resources Means Demand Outweighs Supply

- In Texas, more than 4 million people live below poverty level (US Census Bureau)
- Lack of resources means that **fewer than 10 percent** of low-income Texans receive civil legal services (ABA)
- There is about 1 legal aid lawyer for every 7,000 Texans who qualify for services (Texas Access to Justice Foundation)
- Texas ranks 47th in access to legal aid lawyers (The Justice Index)

Application Process

- Prescreen for Eligibility and Conflict Checks
- Intake Interview
- Staffing Process
 - Each case is reviewed by panel of LANWT Attorneys and Managing Attorney
 - We are unable to provide full representation in every case, but provide some level of service (e.g., legal advice) to each qualified Applicant

Levels of Service

- Advice: Legal advice and counsel related to Applicant's issue
- Brief Service: Legal advice plus additional service (e.g., phone call on Applicant's behalf)
- Full Representation: Extended service, up to and including court appearance
 - The service provided is discretionary and depends on facts of the individual case, available resources at time of application, and Applicant's eligibility

What is a Medical-Legal Partnership (MLP)?

- A healthcare delivery model that integrates legal assistance into patient care
- A collaboration of health and legal professionals to address and prevent health-harming social and legal needs (social determinants of health) for patients and populations
- ➤ There are 442+ partnerships between healthcare and legal institutions
- ▶ 48 states in the United States of America have at least one MLP

A Very Short MLP History

• Delta Health Center in Mississippi, the nation's first federally funded rural health center, hires a lawyer to address patients' food and housing problems 1967 • The first medical-legal partnership is formed at Boston Medical Center after doctors trace pediatric asthma problems back 1993 to moldy apartments
• Following an article in the New York Times about the Boston partnership, nearly 75 additional partnerships form 2001 between 2001 and 2006 • The National Center for Medical-Legal Partnership launches 2006 A Dallas medical-legal partnership was created. This partnership is with the Children's Medical Center (Children's Health), UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, and Legal Aid of NorthWest Texas (LANWT) • LANWT receives funding to start a new MLP 2018


Average number of unmet legal needs among low-income households

Unfulfilled Legal Needs

"Most at-risk individuals might not know when their social problems actually have legal solutions. And even if at-risk individuals realize the legal nature of their problems, they then must struggle to find legal assistance."

Why MLPs Matter:



- Patients often present with more than just medical problems: underlying legal, social, environmental, and financial problems impair health
- By treating these circumstances, MLPs can prevent the povertyrelated cycle of medical problems and hospitalizations
- Research has shown that when legal services and expertise are used to address social needs, people are (1) admitted to the hospital less frequently (2) more likely to take their medication as prescribed and (3) report lower levels of stress (Journal of Health Care for the Poor and Underserved and Journal of Clinical

Tarrant County Medical-Legal Partnership

- Collaborative effort:
 - Legal Aid of NorthWest Texas (LANWT)
 - MHMR of Tarrant County
- Provide civil legal services to low-income individuals who are receiving services at MHMR
- Staff attorneys will be located at 3136 W 4th Street, Fort Worth, TX
- The goal is to eliminate legal obstacles that interfere with the ability of clients to stabilize their lives and receive needed mental healthcare services

MLP Eligibility

In order for an individual to be eligible to receive services through the MLP, the client must be:

- Income eligible at or below 125% of Federal Poverty guidelines
- Asset eligible Total household assets less than \$10,000 for applicant and \$5,000 for each additional household member
- A U.S. Citizen or qualify under another legal status and
- Have a qualifying legal problem within approved priorities

• The Process

Client

- Client comes to MHMR with a medical/health problem
- Doctor, nurse, social worker, and/or community health worker ("MHMR staff") identifies a potential legal issue (social determinant of health)

Referral

• MHMR staff fills out the "Referral" and submits appropriate referrals via email to MLP office for processing

Intake

- LANWT intake coordinator conducts preliminary intake (e.g., income eligibility, conflicts check)
- If the case is eligible, MLP team meet to determine the specific type of legal services needed
 Client meeting is scheduled to occur in conjunction with MHMR services

Client Meeting • Legal assistance is provided (either brief legal services—advice and counsel—or extended representation)

Evaluati on Legal and healthcare teams work together to evaluate impact of representation

Tarrant County MLP Highlights and Success Stories

- 275 Referrals in 2019
 - 58%-Income Benefits (SSI/SSDI/Medicare/Medicaid/SNAP/SUAP)
 - 24%-Housing Cases
 - 12%-Personal and Family Stability (Guardianship/Power of Attorney/Probate)
 - 6%-Non-TCMLP Eligible cases (Criminal/Personal Injury, Child Support and Divorce cases)
- Top four referring clinics
 - 1. Circle Drive Clinic
 - 2. Western Hills Clinic
 - 3. Homeless Clinic
 - 4. Penn Square Clinic

Case #1: Eviction Prevention

It was late Friday afternoon, Sam was facing an eviction hearing Monday morning and her subsidized housing application would be denied if she was evicted. She was sick and could no longer afford her rent payments. MHMR referred the case to the MLP team. Sam was represented by a MLP attorney at the hearing and the eviction was dismissed. Her application for subsidized housing was approved. Currently, she is in the process of moving into a more affordable and habitable property and there is no eviction on record or credit report.

Case #2: Benefits Restored

MHMR referred Kathy to TCMLP due to a denial of a recertification of her Medicaid eligibility and SSI. Kathy has an IDD diagnosis and the benefits that she received allowed her to live in an adult foster home in the community, where she had been very successful. Kathy also received case management services, RX drug coverage, and a home nurse through her Medicaid eligibility. The denial of her benefits would have taken all that away. Thanks to the MLP's intervention and advocacy, Kathy was able to remain in her adult foster home and retain her eligibility for program services and cost coverage for insurance premiums that allowed Kathy to obtain her full SSI monthly check.
